



Introduction

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Type of manuscript must be one of the following: *Scientific Article*, *Clinical Article*, *Case Report*, or *Literature Review*.

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Journal: Bogert TR, García-Godoy F. Effect of prophylaxis agents on the shear bond strength of a fissure sealant. *Pediatr Dent* 1992;14:50-1. For journals, list all authors when there are 6 or fewer; when there are 7 or more, list the first 3, then "et al." Page numbers should be elided where possible. For example: 12-8, 191-5, 347-51.

Web citations archived on WebCite will not disappear in the future. Authors should provide direct references to original sources whenever possible. Avoid using abstracts or literature reviews as references. If possible, avoid references to papers accepted but not yet published. If such a citation is necessary, these papers should be cited as being "In press," and verification that they have been accepted for publication must be provided. Where possible, references of easily accessible material are preferable to dissertations, theses, and other unpublished documents.

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
